- No scratching your head or spitting!

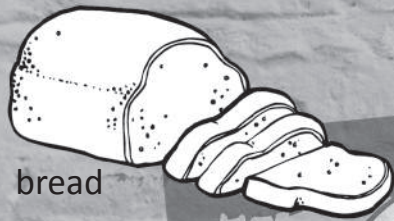

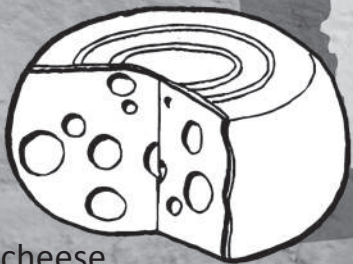

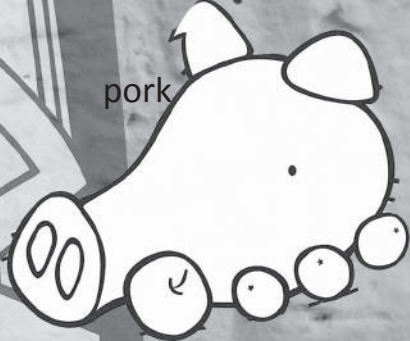
